1. **Daniel Weaver** – Born April 18, 1852 in PA (per death certificate), died January 25, 1927 in York County, PA (per death certificate) and buried at Red Lion Cemetery in Red Lion, York County, PA
2. **Mary Waughtel** – Born May 19, 1950 in PA (per death certificate), died August 20, 1928 in York County, PA (per death certificate) and buried at Red Lion Cemetery in Red Lion, York County, PA
3. **Leah Weaver** – Born August 28, 1874 in York County, PA (per death certificate), died October 5, 1954 in York County, PA (per death certificate) and buried at Mount Rose Cemetery in Spring Garden Twp, York County, PA. She first married **Robert Lentz** who was born January 13, 1868 in York County, PA (per death certificate), died January 7, 1957 in York County, PA (per death certificate) and buried at Red Lion Cemetery in Red Lion, York County, PA. She then married **Joseph Barley** who was born January 8, 1872 in York County, PA (per death certificate), died May 25, 1948 in York County, PA (per death certificate) and buried at Mount Rose Cemetery in Spring Garden Twp, York County, PA


Location of residence

- Daniel lived in either the house that is located at what is now 86 N. Main St. or the 3-story home that was located just to the north of the house at 86 N. Main St. on the same tract of land. There is a recorded deed transaction between Catherine Meyer and Daniel Weaver in 1879 (Deed book 6-S-143) for a property located along N. Main St. This property was transferred to William Algier in 1881 (Deed book 6-T-481), to William Fulks in 1884 (Deed book 7-F-379), to Lysander William Findlay in 1886 (Deed book 7-Q-128) and to Frank Stiles in 1889 (Deed book 8-J-692). The 1904 city directory list Frank Stiles as residing at what is now 86 N. Main St. and his brother residing in the home at 90 N. Main St. on the same property.

Therefore it is almost certain that Daniel lived at either 86 N. Main St. or 90 N. Main St. in 1880, but the order of households listed in the 1880 census suggest the Weaver's lived at 86 N. Main St. For the most part, the census taker has listed families along the first block of N. Main St. in order from the square heading north. After the home of Jacob Miller was visited at 62 N. Main St. on the south side of the railroad tracks, the next 6 households visited in order were those of (1) George Dietz, (2) William Algier, (3) Henry Paules, (4) Daniel Weaver, (5) Noah Olp and (6) Catherine Meyers.

Deed transactions verify that Henry Paules lived at what is now 84 N. Main St., which was the third house north of the railroad tracks. Coincidentally, his household was the 3rd one visited by the census taker north of the railroad tracks. Since, Daniel's household was visited right after Henry's, Daniel more than likely lived at 86 N Main St. Also, the book titled *Red Lion: The First One Hundred Years*, states the house at 86 N Main St. was the home of Daniel Weaver in 1879.

The 1929 Sanborn Fire Insurance map below shows the property originally owned by Daniel Weaver. It shows two dwellings on the same property, the one located at 86-88 N Main St. which is still in existence today and the 3-story, narrow dwelling at 90 N. Main St. that has since been torn down. Both dwellings also appear on the 1908 Sanborn Fire Insurance Map and on a 1904 postcard.



Occupation and Civic Involvement in Red Lion

- Daniel is listed as a wagon maker in the 1880 census and subsequent 1881 and 1883 city directories. After that, his occupation is listed as a farmer and then a laborer.
- Daniel was selected by the quarterly conference of the York Circuit of United Brethren churches to “look up a preaching place in Red Lion borough, and also to secure a lot for a church” (per the 1930 Golden Jubilee book)
- In 1881, Daniel purchased property from Edwin Moul located along W. High St. at what later was numbered 127 W. High St. The home has since been demolished at is now part of the parking lot for Grace Lutheran Church.

Miscellaneous Notes

- Leah and her 2nd husband Joseph Barley lived first in Dallastown before moving to York City.
