Individual Information

1. **John Wagman** – Born December 28, 1851 in York County, PA (per death certificate), died October 20, 1934 in York County, PA (per death certificate) and buried at Saint Mary’s-Saint Patrick’s Cemetery in Spring Garden Twp, York County, PA.

2. **Amanda Carr** – Born December 31, 1859 in York County, PA (per death certificate), died November 15, 1929 in York County, PA (per death certificate) and buried at Saint Mary’s-Saint Patrick’s Cemetery in Spring Garden Twp, York County, PA.

Location of residence

- Beach Nichols 1876 Atlas of York County shows H. Wagman owning two properties. Since previous research has uncovered that Henry Wagman lived at the residence along S. Franklin St., Henry Wagman was John’s father, no other Wagman’s lived in Red Lion in 1880 and the next household on the census visited was that of Daniel Spotts, the house of H. Wagman highlighted below is almost certainly the residence of John Wagman in 1880. The book titled *Red Lion: The First One Hundred Years* states John Wagman lived at 101 N Main St. in 1880, however he did not purchase that property until 1891. In 1880 it was owned by Catherine Meyer, who eventually sold it to Adam Krout, then Adam Krout sold it to John Wagman in 1891.
- It is unclear if the home is still in existence today, the home located at 302 Horace Mann Ave, which is set back off the road and behind the Red Lion Ambulance Company building and just to the west of the Senior High School, could possibly be the residence of John Wagman in 1880.



Occupation and Civic Involvement in Red Lion

- John is listed as a Farm Laborer on the 1880 census and was elected as the first Constable in Red Lion.
- John moved to what is now 101-103 N Main St (house on the northeast corner of N Main St. and E. High St) around 1891 and worked as a butcher and operated a meat market there until at least 1907. By 1910 he left Red Lion and was living in Windsor Township
